

The Annual General Meeting of the Board of Governors of The Memorial Trust of the 2nd Air Division USAAF

This is a summary of my trip to England for the Annual General Meeting of the Board of Governors of The Memorial Trust of the 2nd Air Division USAAF.

I left Chicago on Tuesday evening October 24th for the flight to London Heathrow. Cleared customs about 8:00 am and took the Tube to Liverpool Station. There I caught the 9:30 am train to Norwich. Arrived Norwich about 12:30 pm and checked in to the Swallow Nelson Hotel across from the train station. Paul King had arranged a room there for me.

I called David Hastings upon my arrival and agreed that he would pick me up at 2:30. At 3:00 Paul King had arranged for the visitors from the US to tour the Millennium Library complex which is currently under construction. The American Memorial Room will be part of the complex.

Mr. David Janssens, the Project Director for the Millennium Project, led the tour. In attendance were Paul King (Trust Chairman), David Hastings (Trust Vice-Chairman), Bud Koorndyke (Hon. Life Governor), Chuck Walker (Second Air Division Association representative to the Board of Governors), Carson Holloway (Second Air Division Fulbright Fellow Librarian), Charlie Walker (son of Chuck Walker), and myself, Vicki Warning (representative of the Heritage League of the Second Air Division Association). We signed in for our passes, donned steel-toed boots and hard hats and began our

The building is not yet "under roof" but they hope to be soon -

before winter arrives. The walls are being built of specially made red bricks from the area and are a lovely blend for the area. The Library complex is directly across from St. Peter Mancroft Church, which is the largest church in Norwich. It was built between 1430 and 1455 and stands at one side of the market place and directly across from the Millennium Complex.

In addition to the American Memorial room, the three-story complex will include a Visitor Centre, Business and Learning Facilities, Library, Catering and Bar (restaurant), an Auditorium and a Forum. There will also be two floors for the car park. One special addition to the library grounds will be the planting of a number of American trees. The plans are to have the building completed in May 2001 with a public opening in August 2001. This will be in plenty of time for the planned reunion by the 2ADA in Norwich in November 2001

Following the facilities tour we met with Robin Hall, Chief Executive of the Norfolk and Norwich Millennium Company. He answered many of our questions and showed us samples of the interior flooring, shelving and wood paneling. All very impressive. The dedication and enthusiasm of both Robin and David Janssens was incredible. They certainly made the walls "come alive". I am most anxious to see the finished complex.

That evening I had the honor of having dinner with David and Jean Hastings in their home. It was a most enjoyable evening – and an early evening, as I had not yet slept since my overnight flight from Chicago and our Annual General Meeting of the Board of Governors was to begin at 9:45 am the next morning.

Following breakfast with Chuck and Charlie Walker and Bud Koorndyke, Bud, Chuck and I took a taxi to County Hall for the meeting. Our British friends could not have been more gracious and welcoming. I met each of the Governors who were in attendance and after tea and coffee the meeting was called to order. I was officially welcomed along with Chuck Walker and Bud Koorndyke. Various committee reports were given all of which I found to be quite interesting.

Of special interest however were the reports from the County Archivist, the 2001 convention, Wymondham College, Trust Librarian report and the report from the Events group, which is designing the interior of the Memorial Room.

The County Archivist discussed the need to properly archive the articles at the Library. \ Bringing the records into a generally recognized standard for archiving will ensure that all property and donations can be easily accessed and are available.

The 2001 convention planning is moving forward. At the current time they expect approximately 600 attendees. There will be a special event/activity planned for the Friends and Heritage League. We want to encourage as many people as we can to sign up for the event. Details will be included in the convention packet that Evelyn sends

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to those who have signed up to attend the reunion.

At Wymondham College they are working on a letter writing exchange with a classroom in the US. This activity will encourage communication between the two countries at the primary school level.

The Library and Memorial Room are housed in temporary quarters. I had a chance to visit the library with Derek Hills and Carson Holloway and was very impressed with what has been accomplished in such a small space. They continue to have visitors from the US and when possible, with some advance notice, arrange for visits to the bases. Many locals make themselves available to visitors from abroad and conduct the visits.

In my tour of the memorial room I viewed the book that contains the various newsletters from the bomb groups and other organizations. The latest Heritage Herald they had was August 1999. I had two more current issues with me and gave them both copies. Their records are in a bit of disarray right now, but my guess is that they do not have a complete set of Heritage Heralds. A formal request should be made of Derek Hills and Carson Holloway for confirmation.

The presentation by Derek of the

Event Communications Ltd in London was incredible. This group is designing the interior of the memorial room. He brought plans of the room and shared with us a model of the 28-foot mural that will adorn one wall of the Memorial room. It is quite spectacular and includes pictures of WAC's, bombers, newlyweds, school children talking to pilots, a crew working on a plane and Jimmy Stewart receiving a medal.

The Memorial Area will include the remembrance book and the Bomb Group Banners. The \$3,000 check presented by the Heritage League will be used to the purchase a large picture of the cemetery at Madingley, Cambridge.

The meeting recessed for lunch and many of the past Governors joined us for refreshments, sandwiches and pastries. I had a chance to visit with many of the governors.

During the afternoon session of the meeting I presented a report on the Heritage League activities. They were most impressed with the interest and activity of our organization. Both David and Paul spoke highly of the Heritage League meetings they have attended in the US. The presentation of the \$3,000 check was most overwhelming to them. Unfortunately I did not get a

picture but I know Paul did write a note to Irene.

The meeting adjourned at 3:45 pm. Afterward I spoke with Kevin Thomas of the Friends and now a Governor and he is most excited about the event planned for the November 2001 reunion with the Friends and Heritage League. Many of the Friends will be volunteering their time to act as tour guides on the buses. They are most excited about our coming. David Neale of the Friends reported that they would be having their annual Thanksgiving dinner and expect a sellout crowd.

I'm sure I have forgotten something – and do apologize for being so delayed in getting this to you all. I will review my notes again and follow up with anything I have forgotten.

I want to thank you, the officers of the Heritage League, for the opportunity you have given me to represent the Heritage League in England at the Board of Governors. I will do my best to represent you well and keep you informed of continuing developments and activities.

THE WILD BLUE YONDER

The official Air Force song sung by thousands of aviation cadets marching to and from the flight line was born out of a contest sponsored by the old Liberty magazine. It was selected from some 757 entries by a group of Air Force wives.

It was submitted by Robert MacArthur Crawford, a graduate fellow of New York's Julliard School of Music who bought and learned to fly his own airplane and was know as the flying baritone and sang the song in its first public presentation at the Cleveland Air Races on Sept. 2, 1939.

When the U.S. entered the war, Crawford became a pilot in the Air Transport Command and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel. He died in 1961 and, as a tribute to him, the first score of his song was carried to the surface of the moon on July 30, 1971 aboard the only Apollo crew made up entirely of Air Force officers-the Apollo 15 Falcon lunar module. As the Falcon blasted off the surface of the moon, a rendition of the Air Force Song was broadcast to the world from the Endeavor command module orbiting the moon. Although the first verse is well known, the other two verses are seldom heard, and the chorus (which we sang as cadets) is hardly known; but here it is, as it is today.

Off we go, into the wild blue vonder,

Climbing high, into the sun;

Here they come, zooming to meet our thunder,

At 'em boys, giver the gun

Down we dive, spouting our flame from under

Off with one helluva roar!

We live in fame or go down in flame, hey!

Nothing'll stop the U.S. Air Force!

Minds of men fashioned a crate of thunder,

Sent it high, into the blue;

Minds of men busted the world asunder,

How they lived God only knew! Souls of man dreaming of skies to conquer

Gave us wings ever to soar!

With scouts before and bombers galore, hey!

Nothing'll stop the U.S. Air Force!

Off we go into the wild sky yonder, Keep the wings level and true. And you'll live to be a gray-haired wonder

Keep the nose out of the blue! Flying men guarding the Nation's border, We'll be there, followed by more! In echelon we carry on, hey! Nothing'll stop the U.S. Air Force

To a friend we'll send a message of

His fellow men who fly

And drink to those who gave their all of old

And down we roar to score the rainbow's pot of gold

A toast to the host of those we boast

The U.S. Air Force

B-24 LIBERATOR STATE & CITY NAMES

Many B-24 Liberators of the Mighty Eighth were named after State or City locations thereby carrying hometown pride to the airbases in England and over enemy targets.

State and city names sometimes were chosen as a token of appreciation to those people of a locale who helped raise money through war bond purchases to finance the cost of a particular aircraft. ear Friends of the 44th Bomb Group: My name is Ed Tkacik and I was a member of the Jack Ketchum and Jack Spencer's bomber crew prior to going over to England on the III De France . Once we arrived at the Shipdham Airfield I was a replacement on another crew that flew out of the same field, we in the 506th B24 Squadron with pilot Roy Owens, I was a nose gunner. The Ketchum crew completed their last mission before the war was over and were headed home to the states when something caused them to become enmeshed with the OSS and a catastrophe according to a book written by a nephew of one of the gunners, from the Ketchum crew, after many years of investigations to find the truth of his Uncle Raymond Davis's demise on their way home after the war. The name of the book is "Flight of the Forgotten" written by Mr. Mark A. Vance. If after reading the book, you can shed any light on the authenticity of the facts he has presented, and one piece of authenticity required is the copy of the "Stars and Stripes", the June issue of 1945 that is alleged to have the news of the demise of the Ketchum crew in a B24 crash. If this is truly a fact then all the copies could not have been destroyed to cover up the existence of this issue. If you have any knowledge of this issue, please
