## MINUTES OF THE THIRD MEETING OF THE HERITAGE LEAGUE November 4, 1989 - Hilton Head, South Carolina

The Annual Meeting of the Heritage League of the 2nd ADA held their annual meeting on Saturday, November 4, 1989 in the Hyatt Hotel, Hilton Head, S.C.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Vicki Brooks Warning.

Virginia Belward, Secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting held in COlorado Springs, Colorado, June 24, 1988. The minutes were approved as read.

The Treasurer, Helen Freudenthal reported a balance on hand of \$3,241.00 as off October 30, 1989. The Treasurer's report was approved as read.

The Vice President, Membership, C.N. "Rusty" Chamberlain III was unable to attend the meeting, therefore, Vicki Warning gave his report. The membership continues to grow and as of November 4, 1989 the membership numbered 472. The report was approved as read.

The Vice President, Communications, Norma M. Beasley reported that 2 editions of the League Newsletter had been published and distributed to the membership including the Officers, Group V.P.'s and Assistants of the 2nd ADA and also the Board of Governors including the Library Staff in England. The 3rd edition of the newsletter is planned for distribution about December 15, 1989.

Vicki Brooks Warning, President reported on League activities for 1988 and 1989. She stated that thanks to the members continued interest in searching out eligible people and signing them up, the League is growing. She further asked those members present to give a show of hands if they were planning to attend the July, 1990, 43rd Annual Reunion of the 2nd ADA to be held in Norwich, England. 20 of the 38 members present plan to attend.

Honorary memberships and plaques for outstanding work or help to the League were then awarded by the President, V icki Warning. The recipients were <u>Judge Dietrick</u>, Legal Representative, <u>Mabel Wallich</u>, Accountant and <u>Craig A</u>, <u>Beasley</u>, Publisher.

A motion was made and unanimously approved to donate \$1,000 to the 2nd Air Division Memorial Librarian Fund.

Anne Barne, a member of the Board of Governors of the Memorial Trust, England spoke briefly about the Trust. The Trust has promoted the Library very successfully and hopes to continue working with the League in its maintenance. The Library is a growing, living thing connecting the Americans to the English. There is consideration of opening branch libraries around Norwich as a result of this successful program. She further stated that our English friends are working hard in preparation for our visit to Norwich and the bases in July, 1990. They are hoping to be able to pair members of the Friends and the League according to age and interest. Plans are in progress for a special get-together.

Donation of books for the blind to the Library and books in general were discussed. It was the consensus of the membership that Phyllis Hunt, the present Librarian, should be contacted to see what is needed. Vicki Warning stated she would get in touch with Phyllis Hunt and advise the membership.

Helen Freudenthal was directed to invest the League's money in an interest bearing account. (See the Treasurer's report)

The following slate of officers for the League were unanimously approved: President, Vicki Brooks Warning; Executive Vice President, Ruth Berkley; Secretary, Virginia V. Belward; Vice President Membership, C.N. "Rusty" Chamberlain III; Vice President, Communications, Norma M. Beasley; Directors at Large (3years) Milton Veynar, (2 years) Helen Low, (1 year) Mary Beth Barnard.

The name *Heritage Herald* for the newsletter was adopted unanimously by the membership. Vicki Brooks Warning Stated that the Bylaws of the League were being reviewed for revision and presentation at the meeting in Norwich, July, 1990.

No further business. The meeting was adjourned.




### GREETINGS TO THE HERITAGE LEAGUE FROM THE MEMORIAL TRUST OF THE 2ND AIR DIVISION USAAF IN NORWICH, ENGLAND



Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to say just a few words about the unique Memorial Trust of the 2nd Air Division USAAF, a Charitable Trust which is based in Norwich with the responsibility of looking after the living 2nd Air Division USAAF Memorial Library which is a wonderful room housed in the Norwich Central Library in the center of the area of England which contained the 2nd Air Division bases in World War Two. Trust is administered by a Board of Governors, who with the exception of the American Governor Jordan Uttal, are all local people who are willing to give up their spare time to serve the Memorial. Over recent years the Trust has spread its wings far wider than the 2nd Air Division USAAF Memorial Library itself, with new branch library collections being established, as well as a center in Europe for archives and research on the Air War in Europe and the growing educational side. The staff of the Memorial include an American Librarian and a Trust Aide. As you can see, this very lovely room is far more than just a library of American books, but it plays a vital role in our Community to not only explain to future generations the great debt they owe to those 6,400 young Americans who gave their lives for our freedom in the Forties, but to also convey to them America and the American way of life. The links from the Memorial spread far and wide and only last year a new organization was formed, 'The Friends of the 2nd Air Division Memorial' to establish even closer links with all the Norfolk and Suffolk villages where the airfields were built. Fortunately for us in England, it is still easy for our youngsters to understand what the Memorial is all about, as you can still walk on many of the old airfields, see the runways and inter the huts where you can almost 'hear those American voices', the only thing which can never be repeated is the roar of over 1,000 four engined Liberator bombers as they circled over Norfolk gaining height and formation before setting course for Germany. My generation will never forget those sights and sounds and the great friendship we received from the 2nd Air Division.

Norwich itself has not changed much in character since the war. New buildings have emerged from the gaps caused by the Blitz and the bombing, but we have managed to retain the beauty of the Capital of East Anglia. Even some of the old airfields are still active, indeed Norwich Airport was a 2nd Air Division base and students still learn to fly from Seething and Shipdham. The people who knew the Division during the War still hold fond memories of their 'American Friends' and that is why next year in July 1990, the entire area is already excited about the return to Norfolk of the 2nd Air Division for their Annual Reunion. A great program is being planned, from the official welcome at Heathrow and Gatwick, the special Private Trains to Norwich, the Memorial Service in our beautiful Cathedral and the visits to the Bases and the villages. This year, the main activities will be centered in our new and unique Sport Village in Broadland, the first ever Sports Village complex in the United Kingdom and capable of seating over 2,000 people. During the program we are hoping that our youngsters can get together with any members of the Heritage League who are attending, for there is no doubt in my mind that the long term future of this unique Memorial lies in the hands of future generations. They must ensure that the unique bond of friendship between our two Countries which we built up is never lost, so that the memory of those young men who died will live on forever.

### REFLECTIONS ON THE 2ND AIR DIVISION ASSOCIATION AMERICAN LIBRARIAN FUND DRIVE



Dear Friends of the Heritage League:

In early July of 1989, after my attendance at the Board of Governors meeting in Norwich, and a hectic schedule of visiting all the bases of the 2nd Air Division in Norfolk and Suffolk, and being greeted along with my colleagues with warmth and affection, tired as I was, my spirits were suffused with a warm glow. While recuperating from those efforts, so to speak, with my family down in Surrey, out of the blue, came an invitation to speak to a class of 9 to 10 year old boys at a Public School (private) in Caterham, a history class taught by a retired Royal Air Force Air Commodore.

It was most refreshing to be greeted, the next morning, by these bright young faces and bodies, properly decked out in their green blazers and grey flannel trousers. And, how eager they were to learn about our 2nd Air Division role in the Wary.

Of course, I told them about the Division exploits, the grievous loss of 6,400 fellow Americans, the 2nd Air Division Memorial in Norwich, and the 2nd Air Division Association. The question and answer period that followed was most stimulating to me and went on far past the time allotted, with the Master's permission, or course. To me, the most interesting question was, 'What was the most important result of the War?' My answer came immediately, <u>FRIENDSHIP</u>, and I proceeded to tell them about:

- · The close bonds between the men who flew together.
- Equally close feelings between them and the men and women of the Division who made it
  possible for them to fly.
- The creation of the Memorial in Norwich to honor the memory of the fallen as well as the survivors, and the people of East Anglia who befriended us.
- The Growth of the Memorial and the efforts of the Board of Governors and the people of Norfolk and Suffolk.
- The warm welcome we have always received at each of our six conventions in England as well as our in between visits.
- The Growth of attendance at Association Conventions from 130 in 1948 to the 1,400 who will be at Hilton Head.
- The warmth and affection that is so evident at these conventions irrespective of what group one served with, rank, or wartime job.
- The Fund Drive to raise \$500,000 for an American Librarian, and the generous response from our members, which, in July totalled \$170,000 and which today is \$257,000.
- The formation in the United States of our Heritage League dedicated to preserving the recognition of our efforts, and the sacrifices made.
- The formation in Norwich of The Friends of the 2nd Air Division Memorial consisting of people, young and old, from the villages around each base, dedicated to support of the Memorial.
- And, finally, how all this represents one of the finest instincts of mankind...the desire
  to reach out and to hold on to those who have shared an intense common experience.
  In short the human craving and need for <u>FRIENDSHIP</u>.

On a personal basis, as one of the seven co-founders of the Association in 1948, its President on two occasions, a member of the Board of Governors of the Trust for the past 17 years, and of the Executive Committee of the Association, I cherish the friendships I have made during all that time...the support given me in time of personal stress. I have been profoundly moved by the notes from members in many of the 1,500 checks I have received since the start of the Librarian Drive, notes expressing support for the project, and appreciation for my service to the Association.

Be assured, I have been repaid, many times over, by the expressions of friendship for which I am most thankful. This Association and our Memorial have been very important parts of my life. It has enriched me and enlarged my love for my fellow man. Friends of the 2nd Air Division Memorial is a volunteer group formed to act in support of the Governors of the Second Air Division Memorial Room, Norwich Central Library, Bethel Street, Norwich. The Memorial Room is a 'living memorial' to the young American men and women who served on airfields throughout East Anglia during WWII.

The Second Air Division flew from many airfields close to Norwich. Survivors of those 'dark days' of WWII will remember the large formations of B-24 Liberators droning across the East Anglian coastline to attack targets in Nazi occupied Europe. Many local people recall the horror of Liberators limping back, engines on fire, controls shot away, crews injured, often dead.

The 'Friends' does not seek to promote war; it does, however, seek to remember the great contribution made by the Second Air Division. Veterans of this period some 44 years ago are of an age averaging 68 years, and they remember with great affection the warmth of the British people, especially during such austere times of war time. Many friendships were forged then; they still endure to this day. It is the proud hope of the 'Friends of the Second Air Division Memorial' that they extend these friendships across the generations, so as to perpetuate the Anglo-American links of yesteryear.

In 1990, possibly for the last time en masse, the Second Air Division returns to our shores. Then, over 1,000 of them will be in Norwich once again. They will want to know "where they can buy English fish and chips and what became of the pub where they drank 'warm' British beer?' Perhaps one last chance to trace a lost friend...others will wish to visit, some for the first time since WWII, their old airfields, to recall in silent tribute lost buddies who didn't make it back. These fine people, veterans of fearful conflicts so necessary at the time, have not only a special place in history, but a very special place in the hearts of the local people, to this end:

The men and women of the Second Air Division are returning to pay their tribute to the local people of East Anglia. It is their declared aim and wish to meet with the British people, for whom they have great affection and admiration.

The Friends of the Second Air Division Memorial have an important part to play in the success of this forthcoming visit. It is envisaged that schools, clubs, institutes and recreational centers all may wish to host American visitors during their 1990 Convention here in Norwich. There are many ways, large and small, ways which we can all ensure the goodwill of this visit.

Join us as a Friend now, that we might continue to work towards an even greater bond of friendship between our two great nations. What greater tribute then, could we pay them, or ourselves, than that we should ensure that their "living memorial" lives on forever.
