The Second Air Division Association was born at a party of former personnel of Headquarters, 2 A.D., in Chicago in 1947 and 1948 at the home of Howard Moore. To the best of my recollection, those present were Jordan Uttal, Ray Strong, Percy Young, Clem Kowalalczyk, myself and of course Howard Moore. As I look back to the formative years of the Association, I would say Howard was the "spark--plug," Jordan the great organizer, Percy the avuncular sage, Ray the practical "nuts and bolts" genius, Clem the dry humorist who helped us over the difficult times and myself as the "Judge Advocate" and legal counselor.

The early reunions were held in Chicago either at the now gone Sherman House or at the renovated Knickerbocker Hotel. They were very friendly and sociable reunions with both good cheer and good food and drink. Attendance, including spouses, averaged 100 to 150. Little did we dream that in 1990 there would be 7000 members representing every facet of 2 A.D.'s operations.

The Association grew each year with the able assistance of Evelvn Cohen out of Philadelphia as a base. Her devotion to accuracy, her complete mastery of the books and records and her amiable yet tough no-nonsense administration has been an essential ingredient in our success. The "Secretary" barely defines her beneficent influence on the 2 A.D. Association.

The Association taking on the responsibility for the Memorial Room and Library in Norwich, England was really the turning point to becoming a national and international entity. It gave the members of the Association the means to memorialize our comrades who paid the supreme price for freedom and at the same time to have a living memorial in perpetuity to focus on what was accomplished. In this way, the Association is unique.

We knew we were on the right track when an 1963 in Norwich, England we dedicated the completed 2 A.D. Memorial Room and Library. This gave us a focal point for both our memories as well as the repository of our accumulated records, diaries, photos and other memorabilia. Now with the successful completion by Jordan Uttal of the Librarian Fund-Raising, the endowment so established will assure the permanence of those values and ideals. I know that our deceased fellow founders, Howard Moore and Percy Young would be eminently pleased with their and our achievements.

Now, in addition and for the last four years, the Heritage League is poised to carry on the work into the 21st Century and beyond. Bud Chamberlain is to be commended for the tenacity of purpose, as well as the vision, in organizing this "hope for the future."

I am especially proud that I worked closely with him to help the League to become legally viable. There were many unsung heroes during World War II. By the same token there were and are the thousands of Association members who pay their dues. carry on the work and purposes of the organization, who give of their time and treasure, who make the Association a living and breathing entity.

We also have been fortunate in the caliber of the officers and directors of the Association who have so effectively conducted 44 annual reunions both in England and the U.S.A. Naturally, the founders feel grateful to all of those who brought the dream to substantial and meaningful fruition. May our endeavors be marked and remembered in both tangible and intangible

A TASTE OF NORFOLK

Our Friends of the 2nd Air Division Memorial have started a 'CHOW' page in their newsletter which features American recipes. It only seems fitting that we should have a page with recipes from Norfolk. With Thanksgiving Day not too far away the Turkey Recipe seemed like a good one to start with!

WITCHINGHAM TURKEY

In the seventeenth century, great flocks of turkeys (often 500 or more) were driven more than a hundred miles down the rough roads to the London markets. Their feet were bound in rags and dipped in tar to prevent damage, and each night they would be penned in fields by the roadside where they could feast on the remains of the corn in the autumn stubble. Today, turkey is available all the year round and is delicious when simply roasted with a sweet glaze.

INCREDIENTS -.10lb (5kg) turkey .bunch of fresh herbs .4 oz (100g) honey
.salt and pepper .4 oz (100g) butter .1/2 pint (300ml)) apple juice
METHOD - Lightly season inside the bird with salt and pepper. Put in the bunch of herbs.
Cream the butter & honey and spread all over the breast. Put the bird in a roasting tin.
Roast at 400F/200C/Gas Mark 6 for 40 minutes. Pour in apple juice. Baste the bird.Continue to roast at 350F/180C/Gas Mark 4 for 30 min.Baste well, cover with foil.Continue roasting for 45 minutes.Remove foil, baste and continue roasting for 30 minutes.Make gravy with stock from the giblets, and cook roast potatoes separately.

Dear Norma Beasley,

In answer to your first question, I was a Bombardier/Navigator with the 445th Bomb Group, 702 Bomb Squadron flying out of Tibenham, England. I was shot down September 17, 1944 on my last mission and spent the rest of the war as a P.O. W. in Stalag Luft 1 at Barth, Germany.

For almost 40 years, I never thought much about joining any kind of military association although I was in the Air Force Reserves for a few years. When the Vietnam parade was in Chicago some years ago, I stood and watched it for several hours. I was always a "hawk" during the Vietnam conflict and could really relate to the terrible treatment of the Vietnam veterans.

While I was in the viewing area, a lady wearing a jacket with the P.O.W./M.I.A. insignia was standing near me. I questioned her about it and it wasn't too long before her husband, an ex-P.O.W. had me signed up. I have been very active since then in trying to recapture some of my military years which I guess I sort of put behind me for many years. Part of trying to put it all together resulted in the enclosed story which ran in the Chicago Tribune and was picked up by other papers across the country.

As a result of that story, I have had dozens of young people call me and question me about their father's wartime experiences. Some of their fathers were ex-fliers, some were P.O.W.'s and some were actually in my group so we had lots to talk about. Just as you say many of the fathers never spoke about their experiences and are not around now to do so.

Every now and then I tell of an experience of mine and my children are always in awe. But I want them as well as my grandchildren to remember and know why we fought a war. By making it personal, it embeds it in their memory.

I don't think we are leaving our grandchildren a better world so maybe all we can do is give them some pride in what we had and what we fought for.

I have signed up my two grandsons, Max Temkin 4 years old, and Rose Temkin 2 years old, as members. The older one wants to know all about my experiences, etc. So, maybe they will be the generation to carry on the tradition.

Have you visited Old Buckenham since the war?



ENGLAND OR BUST!

If you are blase` and somewhat interested but can't quite get excited about the 2nd Air Division and the Heritage League, may I recommend a trip to England's East Anglia with an imagination that allows you to transcend time. I took just such a trip this August and came away deeply moved.

After a pleasant visit we went to the airfield which is now a huge turkey farm with the old, still intact runways serving as access to lines of turkey condos. Upon arriving we stopped at the little memorial park at the entrance to the base where we placed some flowers at the memorial stone and said a prayer.

We then drove out onto the runways and taxiways. As we stood at one end of the main runway listening to stories and personal accounts, it was easy for me to "hear" the sounds, smell the smells and imagine my Dad at the ripe old age of 21, driving and flying that machine on such a harrowing and grave mission.

As we left, we drove by one of the local pubs (hundreds of years old as they all seem to be) where the gang used to hang out. You can go in and see things just the way they were - even the dart board is in the same place it was in 1944.

What a trip! The hospitality was fabulous. It is really moving to see the commitment that our English friends have towards the perpetuation of the spirit of our organization. They were there! They remember first hand!

I also feel like I know my father a little better than I did before. I recommend a trip to all you Leaguers out there including my brothers.

CHARLES L. (CHUCK) WALKER -

WHO IS CHUCK WALKER?



Needlepoint for Tibenham

Resounding the theme of the 1990 reunion -- "Remember the Villages" -- members of the 445th are designing kneeler covers for All Saints Church in Tibenham. At the Dearborn reunion I was inspired by photographs of completed needlepoint design kneeling pad covers that the church women of Tibenham had made into finished kneelers. My memories awakened, I was motivated to create my own design, and as I share my thoughts and feelings, you too may be so moved.

I had a vivid insight of my mother reading mail from my father when he was in Tibenham. The heavily censored letters were received late; by the time they arrived my father could have been shot down. As I pictured my mother, the words of the hymn, "Lord guard and guide the men who fly" came to mind. I wanted to create a kneeler that captured the love and concern of the mothers, sweethearts, friends, and family as they pray for the safe return of the men who fly. My kneeler commemorates the prayers of safekeeping for all those who fly: those of Tibenham past, those of Tibenham present flying from its WWII runways, and commercial pilots as well as those currently in the Armed Forces.

In the design of my first kneeling pad cover the words of this hymn are in gold around the sides of the cushion contrasting against a deep red background. For the central design on the top of the cushion I borrowed an image and feeling remembered from my first glider ride -- the thrill and the view; the same view of the Tibenham runways and countryside that the men who flew missions saw. I decided on an aerial view with the glider silhouette suspended over the soft and muted landscape, as if after


a light rain. This design, for me, captured a meaningful blend of past and present.

A photograph of the nose art of the 701st Squadron's "Sweetest Rose of Texas" inspired my second needlepoint design. Easily transferred to needlepoint, I could stitch the rose in shades of deep red and the background as if it were the NMF (natural metal finish) of the original plane, showing rivets and seams. The sides of the kneeler would have the serial number and other aircraft identifiers, again in gold on the deep red background. The "Rose", named for Rose Mary Nass of Palestine, Texas, the wife of pilot Arnold Nass, flew over 100 missions with the 445th. My father had flown in the "Rose" on the 16 August 1944 mission to Dessau. Badly crippled, knocked out of formation, and full of holes, she brought Pelton and the crew back to Woodbridge on that date. "Rose" was one of the survivors of the 27 September 1944 Kassel mission. Returned to the US in May 1945, she was unceremoniously scrapped. I create this kneeler to remember "Sweetest Rose" and all those who returned safely because of her.

I hope my thoughts have triggered your imagination. If you would like to create a kneeler, I am including dimensions and other pertinent information:

#10 mesh canvas is recommended Paternayan Persian Wool yarn -color #901 for the background Do not trim excess canvas, leave minimum of 2" for seaming

A DREAM- an editorial

Many of you have heard me speak on a subject that is near and dear to me. The Heritage League. I have a dedication to preserving the history of the Second Air Division for the future generations. I feel a responsibility to pass on to our grandchildren's grandchildren the heritage given to them by their fathers and grandfathers during World War II.

I can envision that someday the Heritage League of the Second Air Division Association will become a prestigious genealogical society. Many of you have received this idea with a bit of skepticism; however, you have not dampened my enthusiasm nor belief in my dream. I have expressed this sentiment on many occasions and felt that I had a unique idea.

However, while researching back issues of the 2nd ADA Journals, I found a copy of a letter written to Earl Zimmerman, then President of the 2nd ADA, from the late General W. E. Kepner that echos my feelings as follows: (Please note his next to last paragraph)

(December, 1977) "OUR LIVING MEMORIAL"

Dear Earl(Zimmerman) and 2nd AD:

My sincere congratulations to all of you for another successful year for the best Air Division in the world. Everybody has done a great job.

I wish I could have been with you to say it in person, but my wife's health, and the lack of reliable help at home, prevents my attending. May I say "hello" and best wishes for a great reunion where the truth about who really won the war was undoubtedly told.

I remember General George Patton's tanks went through the hole in the German lines made by you people, and then you went back to bombing Berlin.

Reich Marshall Herman Goering told General Spaatz that he knew the jig was up when he saw our American fighters knocking down German fighters over Germany out of the war. You all did it so tell it because "you wuzz there!" I'm certain we all have great pride when we think of, and support, our living Memorial in the Norwich Library. The memory of our 6,032 comrades who did not return has succeeded in binding us together with

personal remembrances that speak so clear in the personal letters quoted in our Newsletter. This is proof that we will never forget.

I am glad to pledge a contribution of \$500.00 towards our \$50,000 goal for the Capital Fund. I wish I could have been there to hand it across the table to the treasurer in person. We are in the position of aggressively having left the IP on our run to a target of \$50,000, AND WE WILL MAKE IT!

I read quote from one of our Newsletters that "this would handle the next 'Generation' of needs for the 2nd AD Memorial then our sons and daughters would take over.

This is a fine idea and I urge everyone to think about it. Talk to the younger people. It would be a great idea to copy the 'SAR' and 'DAR' who have succeeded so well. Then when we meet those 6,032, plus some others who have joined them since WWII, we will all have something good to talk about, and be proud of having kept faith with those recorded names contained in the "Book of Memories" resting in our Memorial Room.

Thanks for listening and I hope you all enjoyed yourselves at the reunion. Until we meet again in person and in spirit--bless the 2nd AD.




